

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

New Exhibits Sent in—Death of Assistant A. F. Wood

Among the exhibits sent in to the chamber of commerce yesterday were Washington navel oranges weighing twenty-four ounces and measuring sixteen inches in circumference, tangerine, mandarin and Malta and Italian blood oranges from Charles Richardson, Pasadena; canaigre root and acid, Home ranch company, Los Angeles; seedless Eureka lemons, D. W. Cunningham, Palms; barley in head, G. E. Lewis, Indio; and oranges and lemons from the San Antonio Fruit company. The Covina Citrus association is arranging a handsome table display of citrus fruits, peas and canned goods and photographs of views in the enterprising little town.

W. T. Lambie has turned over to the chamber and yesterday arranged in cases an unusually full collection of California, Arizona, Nevada and Texas mineral specimens, embracing gold, silver, copper, antimony, nickel, plumbago and lead in all sorts of varieties and combination.

Albert F. Wood, whose face has been familiar to chamber of commerce goers for the past four years, died Wednesday at his mother's home, at the corner of Second and Main streets, aged 22 years. Young Wood began work as assistant to Superintendent Wiggins when preparations were made for the exhibit at the world's fair and retained the position until about four months ago when advancing consumption forced him to retire. He went out to Redlands, hoping that the dry pure air of the mesas would restore his health, but found no benefit. The funeral will be held from his mother's residence at 2 o'clock this afternoon.
