ALL KINDS OF MEDALS FROM OMAHA EXPOSITION

Secretary Wiggins Tells of the Closing Days of the Great Fair—List of the Fortunate Ones

The chamber of commerce has resumed its customary air and routine with the return of Secretary and Mrs. Wiggins from the Transmississippi exposition at Omaha. "It was the grandest closing," said the secretary, enthusiastically, "of any exposition I have ever attended. By grand I mean from a financial standpoint. Taking into consideration the time and money spent it far surpassed the World's fair. Four days after it closed the administration paid the stockholders 75 per cent of the original subscription and there is enough money left to pay the other 25 per cent and have the buildings."

"Was that good luck or good management?"

"Mainly good management, for they worked against odds. The Spanish war was against them and the railroads made no reduction of rates until the summer was half over."

"The three last weeks the weather was miserable, yet notwithstanding that the attendance was 2,600,000. Had it been favorable the number would have reached 3,000,000. The medals were all ready to deliver when the exposition closed and Los Angeles county carried off 107 medals and diplomas."

"At the closing exercises at the auditorium when it was announced from the stage that the Los Angeles county exhibit had been one of the main factors in the success of the exposition and it had been awarded one of the grand prizes, the audience rose and gave three cheers."

"We were never treated nicer anywhere," continued Mr. Wiggins. "Everything we asked for in the way of concessions the administration granted and showed us every possible courtesy. We had our goods all packed and out in two and a half days."

"J. H. McGibbin, director of exhibits for the Paris exposition, made sketches of three of the installations, and he said it was the best method of displaying fruits and wines he had ever seen."

He states that already the company has had to increase the coaches on both the limited and the regular passenger trains, and adds: "I do not remember when, under normal conditions, travel to and from California, during the autumn and early fall, was as great as it has been this year, and from the strong increase thus early in the season, the prompt sale of nearly every berth in our first limited trains, the continued heavy volume of business on the daily trains, notwithstanding the inauguration of the limited, and the general indications from large correspondence and reports of our territorial agents on prospective business, I feel sure that the travel to California this winter will be heavier than it has been for many years past. Year by year eastern people are more widely appreciating the superior attractions of Southern California for the tourist, and as you watch our trains come in you will observe that they pretty generally know how to get there."
