

PLAN NEW NET CLUB AT CULVER

W. F. Buck Announces Plans for Fifteen Tennis Courts at Palomar Site

That Culver City will be provided with a real tennis palace is a certainty with the announcement of president W. F. Buck of the new Palomar tennis club in the first edition of the club's monthly paper, in which the entire plans for the club have been explained. The club will be located north of the California Country Club, and will consist of fifteen tennis courts, a swimming pool and one of the best and most beautiful clubhouses in the west. The design of the clubhouse will be Spanish.

W. F. Buck, the newly elected president of the club, takes the greatest of pleasure in confirming the report that Harvey Snodgrass, nationally famous tennis star and sixth ranking national player, will have the position of tennis professional exclusively for the Palomar Tennis Club.

Because of the incompletion of the courts, the opening of the club was postponed until next February. Tennis officials at the new club were in favor of using the county tennis tourney as their opening tournament of the season, but the lack of courts forced the play to be shifted to the Alhambra club. However, the midwinter event may be given the new club for its opening tourney to celebrate its opening. This event is slated unofficially for the 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th of February, 1926.

For the convenience of all players in the club, three classes of courts will be constructed: clay, cement and gravel. The exhibition court grand stand will seat 3500 spectators.

Mr. Buck, president; M. G. Benedict, vice-president; Rans Abbott, sales manager, and B. F. Bressler, secretary and treasurer, are the officers of the organization.
