Nineteen Thousand Avocado Trees Being Planted

Entering the new year with more than 500 acres sold in small units during the fifteen months it has been on the market, Rancho Vista looks forward to one of the best years in the history of the company, declared E. The addition of a new 100-foot structure two stories in height, which is now about half com-pleted, will bring much additional business to this section, Mr. Mullen declared.

One store has been leased and negotiations are pending for the taking of another. Lodge rooms and offices on the second floor will be the most complete and modern in the Vista district, it is asserted.

Planting of the 19,000 avocado trees

on the tract is going forward rapidly, and the rolling slopes present the appearance of intense activity, according to O. F. Dandy of Vista, trace manager. Twenty acres purchased last year by the American Bulb Grow-ers has been planted to many va-cicties. Several nurserymen and avoando experts have purchased property in the vicinity, and plan extensive improvements.

improvements. New buildings are being added in the town of Vista, several homes are under way, the telephone exchange was enlarged and the school is contemplating adding ground.

## Report Shows 26 Subdivisions During Month

As evidenced by the number of new plats filed in the office of the County Recorder, subdividers in the county have been active since the first of the year in the planning and opening of new tracts.

According to statistics compiled by J. V. Carson, statistician of Title In-surance and Trust Company, a total of twenty-six new subdivisions was made during the month of January, or a little more than one new tract each working day. These subdivisions comprise both business and residen-tial properties and include 1849 sep-

tial properties and include 1849 separate lots, or an average of seventy-four lots per working day.

Mr. Carson reported that the largest subdivisitm was in the southwestern section of the city and numbered 989 lots. The first six working days of February have reen eight new subdivision plats recorded.

Oak Knoll Unit Third in Subdivision at Center of Community

Marino and the building permits dur-ing this period of three years amounted to over \$7,000,000.
