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
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

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N the dark days of 1862, when the government at Washington was facing a succession of military reverses and the fate of the Union seemed to hang in the balance, while a pall of ominous gloom rested upon all the North, the first Union League was organized in New York City. Composed of a large number of the leading business men, firms and corporations of that city, it was alike representative of her commercial strength and her patriotic loyalty to the government. The primary and chief purpose of the organization was to give comfort and aid to the government in carrying on the war; or, as declared by its organizers, "to promote, encourage and sustain by all proper means absolute and unqualified loyalty to the government of the United States; to discountenance and rebuke, by moral and social influences, all disloyalty to said government and every attempt against the integrity of the Union." Secondary purposes of the organization were to minister to the comfort and enjoyment of its members with social, library and kindred privileges. Philadelphia soon followed the example of New York and organized the second Union League; while during the following year, and before the dawn of hope in the Union cause broke over the battlefields of Gettysburg and Vicksburg, similar organizations had been formed in a number of other cities of the North. These clubs exerted a strong influence in "making loyalty effective" in both moral and financial support of the government.

Necessarily, all these clubs were in the beginning fundamentally political, the conditions of membership in them requiring a pledge of adherence to the principles of the Republican party, and absolute loyalty to the government of the Union. Many of the clubs soon incorporated and became established institutions, influential in the political, industrial and social affairs of the cities and states in which they were located.

As time healed the wounds inflicted by the Civil War and substituted other issues for those settled with the sword, political alignments were more and more determined by economic and administrative policies of government. While this change was taking place, the Union League organizations throughout the country, extending from coast to coast, grew gradually, in their activities and ministrations, more social and civic, and less political. As a result, many of them have become non-political as regards partisan politics, dropping from their conditions of membership the pledge of fealty to the Republican party, but retaining the pledge of unqualified loyalty to the government of the United States. Thus, in general, the Union League, which for several decades exerted such a potent political influence in city, state and nation, has evolved into a non-partisan institution, whose influence is exerted chiefly on the civic and social life of the nation.

Such also, in brief, has been the history of the UNION LEAGUE OF LOS ANGELES, organized in the spring of 1888. Whatever vision, if any, its founders may have had of the future mission of the organization, its immediate purpose was declared to be "to promote the success of the Republican party," and "to seek to elevate, purify and improve our local, state and national politics."

On March 22, 1889, the LEAGUE incorporated and enlarged its declaration of principles so as to require as a condition of membership "absolute and unqualified loyalty to the government of the United States, the Republican party thereof, and the interests of this LEAGUE"; and also a pledge to "rebuke by moral and social influence and by all proper means, both in public and in private, any disloyalty to the Federal government, and to resist to the utmost every attempt against the territorial integrity of the Nation." This declaration of principles was as resonant with the war spirit of the '60s, as the previous one had been silent on the subject of patriotism.

Thus organized, the UNION LEAGUE OF LOS ANGELES became a political force of considerable effectiveness and the official head of the Republican party in this city; and it was so recognized in several campaigns. It did not, however, essay to minister to the social life of its members, or to participate actively in the civic affairs of the city. Having no permanent club home, and lacking other essentials to stability and perpetuity, the organization naturally lapsed into a state of more or less suspended vitality in the interims between campaigns, and gradually lost power and prestige, until it became no longer representatives of the political and moral strength of the Republican party in Southern California.

In 1898 a band of active and progressive Republicans, prompted by a desire to enhance the influence and promote the success of the party, undertook the task of reorganizing and revitalizing the UNION LEAGUE. They consolidated with it other Republican organizations under a revised declaration of principles, which prescribed for its members active support of the Republican party, "absolute and unqualified loyalty to the government of the United States," advancement of "the cause of good and wise government," and the preservation of "political equality before the law".

The LEAGUE then entered upon a career of activity and service to the party, the city and the state, which soon commanded a financial and moral support which it had not before enjoyed. Its headquarters became more and more the social, as well as the political, home of its members during their leisure hours, necessitating a corresponding enlargement of its club facilities. It soon became apparent that nothing short of a permanent club home, commodious and attractive, could meet the needs of the organization.


The same men, who had effected the reorganization of the LEAGUE, acquired the building which had been the main offices of the Home Telephone Company at 327 West Second Street,

remodeled the structure and equipped it to furnish the comforts and diversions incident to club life. It was thought the accommodations provided would be sufficient to meet the needs of the LEAGUE for years to come; but so rapid was its growth under the progressive spirit which dominated it, that hardly had the house-warming ceremonies attending the occupation of this, the first home of the LEAGUE, ended, when it was realized that more commodious quarters must soon be provided.


Again the same men, in the same spirit, essayed the larger task of providing a club home that would long be adequate to the needs of a live and progressive league in a rapidly growing city. To this end, the property at the northeast corner of Second and Hill Streets was acquired, the hotel building that occupied the site and also the Union League building adjoining it were torn down (the LEAGUE in the meantime occupying temporary quarters), and on the joint sites was erected the nine-story fire-proof structure shown in the following pages. Sightly in its location, complete and attractive in its appointments, and fully equipped to minister to all the needs of such an organization, the home of the UNION LEAGUE OF LOS ANGELES is a credit to both the organization and the city.

Conforming to the trend of current events and the history of the UNION LEAGUE as an institution, the local league some time ago ceased to be a partisan political organization; but with a large and influential membership, that is representative of the aggressive business and civic life of Los Angeles, it is a potent force in the upbuilding of the city and the state, and in the maintenance of "good and wise government".






LADIES' DINING ROOM




MAIN DINING ROOM.







REST AND MUSIC ROOM


LADIES' RECEPTION ROOM







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
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

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# BY-LAWS

## ARTICLE I.—TITLE.

Section I. This organization shall be known as THE UNION LEAGUE OF LOS ANGELES.

## ARTICLE II.—PURPOSE.

Section I. The purpose of this League is to support and inculcate the principles of the Republican Party; to promote, encourage and sustain absolute and unqualified loyalty to the Government of the United States; to further, and by social, moral and political influence assist in advancing the cause of good and wise government and the honest and patriotic administration thereof; to aid, by the same means, in preserving the political equality of all men before the law; and, in furtherance of these objects to carry on and conduct the business of a club house, to establish and maintain a library and reading room and such other conveniences and means of entertainment as the government of the League may from time to time deem necessary or proper; and to purchase and hold or lease any property real or personal necessary or proper for the purposes above set forth.

## ARTICLE III.—GOVERNMENT.

Section I. The government of the League shall be vested in a Board of Directors nine in number who shall be selected by the members of the League, at an election to be held on the first Monday in April in each year. The term of office of each Director shall be three years, or until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; three Directors being elected at each annual meeting. At the annual meeting to be held on the first Monday in April, 1903, nine Directors shall be elected, three to serve for one year, three for two years, and three for three years.

Sec. II. The Board of Directors shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur from death, resignation, or otherwise among the officers or directors, and it may, by a vote of two-thirds of the whole Board, remove or suspend any officer, and appoint one of its members to discharge the duties of the officer so removed or suspended.

Sec. III. The Board of Directors shall have power:

1. To make such rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary for the protection of the property of the League, the management of the League headquarters, and the preservation of good order therein.
2. To limit or suspend the credit and privileges of any member of the League.
3. To appoint and remove all committees provided for herein, and to fill all vacancies occurring from any cause in said committees.
4. To make all contracts for the League, which contracts, when in writing, shall be signed by the President and Secretary and attested by the seal of the League.
5. To appoint and remove an Assistant Secretary and all other employees, and to fix, increase, and reduce their compensations.
6. By a two-thirds vote of its members, to levy assessment on the members of the League.
7. To elect a President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, who shall hold office for one year. The President and Vice-President must be members of the Board of Directors.

Sec. IV. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on the first Tuesday of each month and special meetings at the call of the President or a quorum of the Board, or upon the written request of twenty members of the League.

Sec. V. The President shall preside at all meetings of the League and of the Board of Directors. He shall be ex-officio a member of all standing committees. He shall sign all checks or orders upon the Treasurer and all other written instruments required to be signed by him.

Sec. VI. In the absence of the President, the duties of his office shall devolve upon the Vice-President. In the absence of the President and Vice-President, a temporary President shall be elected.

Sec. VII. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the League and of the Board of Directors and shall file all papers and documents that belong to its archives. He shall countersign all checks or orders upon the Treasurer and all other written instruments required to be signed by him. He shall notify members of all meetings of the League, post all bulletin notices, notify persons of their election as members and conduct the correspondence of the League. He shall keep the accounts of the members, collect all indebtedness, keep an account thereof and deposit the same to the League's credit in such bank as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Sec. VIII. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the League, keep an account thereof, subject at all times to the investigation of the Board of Directors, and pay the same out only upon the check or order of the President, countersigned by the Secretary. At each annual meeting of the League, he shall make and render a report in writing showing the financial condition of the League, which report shall be filed with the Secretary and be open to inspection by members of the League at any time. The Treasurer shall give such bond for the faithful performance of his duties as may be fixed by the Board of Directors.

#### COMMITTEES.

Sec. IX. The standing committees of this League shall consist of a committee on "Membership," which shall consist of three members, to whom shall be referred all applications for membership in the League.

A "House Committee," to consist of three members whose duty it shall be to supervise the purchase of all supplies and furnishings needed by the League, subject, however, to the advice and control of the Board of Directors.

Sec. X. The President shall have power to appoint such temporary committees as in his judgment, he may deem best. He shall appoint an "Auditing" Committee of three members, whose duty it shall be to audit all bills and accounts each month and to file a written report thereof with the Board of Directors, previous to the annual meeting.

Sec. XI. All standing committees shall hold office for a period of one year next succeeding their election or appointment, and until their successors are elected or appointed.

#### ARTICLE IV.—OWNERSHIP.

Section I. The legal title and ownership of all property, effects and assets of the League shall vest in the Board of Directors in trust for the enjoyment, use, and benefit of the members.

Sec. II. Any person ceasing, from any cause to be a member of the League, shall forfeit, ipso facto, all right, title, and interest in or to the property, funds, or assets of the League, or in or to any part thereof.

#### ARTICLE V.—MEMBERSHIP.

Section I. The membership of the League shall consist of the following classes, viz: Active Members, Life Members, Honorary Members and Non-Resident Members.

**Sec. II.** Active Members are those who are entitled to all the privileges of the League, including the right to vote at meetings and elections. They include, aside from Life Members, the following subdivisions, viz.:

A. City Members: Those residing in the City of Los Angeles or within a radius of twenty miles of said City. The dues of such members shall be \$3.50 per month beginning January 1st, 1910, payable monthly in advance. The number of City Members shall not exceed eight hundred.

B. Suburban Members: Those residing within fifty miles of the City of Los Angeles and without the twenty mile radius. The dues of such members shall be \$18.00 per year, payable quarterly, in advance.

C. State Members: Those residing within the State, but at a distance from Los Angeles greater than fifty miles. The dues of such members shall be \$12.00 per year, payable semi-annually, in advance.

**Sec. III.** Any member of the League may, by a majority vote of the Board of Directors, become a Life Member thereof, upon payment of the Life Membership fee as follows:

\$500.00 at the age of 21 to 30.  
\$450.00 at the age of 30 to 35.  
\$400.00 at the age of 35 to 40.  
\$350.00 at the age of 40 to 45.  
\$300.00 at the age of 45 to 50.  
\$250.00 at the age of 50 or over.

Life Members shall have the same rights and privileges as other Active Members, but shall be exempt from the payment of any dues.

**Sec. IV.** Army and Navy officers, active or retired, shall be entitled to the privileges of the Club, and persons who are eminently distinguished in politics, literature, art or science, may be made Honorary Members of the League. They shall be entitled to all the privileges of the League, except that they shall not vote nor hold office. They shall be elected in the same manner as Active Members are elected, but shall pay no entrance fee or dues.

**Sec. V.** Non-residents of the State of California may be made members of the League. They shall be entitled to all the privileges of the League, except that they shall not vote nor hold office. They shall be elected in the same manner as Active Members are elected and pay an entrance fee of \$10.00 and dues the same as for State Members.

**Sec. VI.** The name, occupation, residence and business address of each person proposed for membership, together with the name of the member proposing, and the name of the member seconding the same, shall be posted by the Secretary in a conspicuous place in the League headquarters for the term of one week, after which the Committee on Membership must pass upon the application, and the application, with their recommendation indorsed thereon, shall be brought before the Board of Directors at their next meeting. The Board of Directors shall then either elect or reject the said applicant. The vote shall be taken by secret ballot, and three black balls shall reject.

**Sec. VII.** All persons elected members must sign the By-Laws or signify their acceptance of the election within thirty days after the date of their election, otherwise they may be deemed to have forfeited their right of membership.

**Sec. VIII.** No candidate for membership who shall have been rejected shall be again proposed for membership within a period of one year from the date of such rejection, save upon the unanimous vote of the Board of Directors.

**Sec. IX.** Whenever a change of residence brings a member within a different class of membership, as hereinbefore defined, it shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to cause the name of such member to be recorded in the proper class, and the Secretary shall collect dues accordingly.

In case any member shall absent himself from the fifty-mile radius for a period

not less than three months in succession, the amount of his dues may be made the same as for non-residents at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Sec. X. Any former member, who, while in good standing, may have resigned from the League, or whose membership may have otherwise ceased, may be readmitted upon the payment of such a sum for entrance fee as the Board of Directors may determine. The name of such former member need not be posted, but a ballot shall be taken thereon in like manner as in other cases.

Sec. XI. All classes of membership shall be transferable, subject to such terms and conditions, rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE VI.—FEES, DUES, AND OTHER INDEBTEDNESS.

Section I. The admission fee must accompany the application and shall be as follows:

- A. For City Members, Seventy-five Dollars.
- B. For Suburban Members, Fifty Dollars.
- C. For State Members, Ten Dollars.
- D. For Non-Resident Members, Ten Dollars.

Sec. II. All indebtedness, other than fees or dues, shall become due and payable monthly at the end of each month within which said indebtedness accrues.

#### ARTICLE VII.—SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS.

Section I. Any member who may conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman, either in the League or elsewhere, or who may conduct himself in a manner calculated to disturb the harmony, or impair the good name or prosperity of the League, may be reprimanded, suspended or expelled, as the Board of Directors may determine.

Sec. II. All charges of misconduct of members shall be preferred in writing to the Board of Directors, whereupon the Board shall fix a time and hear the same. The accused shall have at least ten days' notice in writing of the charges preferred against him and of the time when the same will be heard, and opportunity shall be given him to appear and defend. Such notice shall be served by the Secretary, by mailing such notice to the accused at his Postoffice address, as contained in the records of the League, and by depositing such notice in the letter box at the League headquarters, addressed to the accused.

Sec. III. Any member may be suspended or expelled for the non-payment of dues or other indebtedness as in the following sections provided.

Sec. IV. Whenever any member shall fail or neglect, for a period of thirty days, to pay any dues or other indebtedness that shall have become due and payable, the Secretary shall notify such member of his delinquency by written notice, which notice shall be served by mailing such notice to the delinquent at his Postoffice address, as contained in the records of the League.

Sec. V. If such dues or other indebtedness shall remain unpaid, in whole or in part, for a further period of thirty days after such notification, the member thus notified may, without further notice, be expelled by the Board of Directors, or the Board may, in its discretion, suspend such delinquent member from the privileges of the League until such dues or other indebtedness shall have been fully paid; but such suspension shall in nowise relieve such member from any obligation or liability from any obligation or liability to the League as a member thereof.

#### ARTICLE VIII.—RESIGNATIONS.

Section I. All resignations must be made to the Secretary in writing. No resignation shall be considered until all indebtedness is fully paid, or secured to the satisfaction of the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE IX.—MEETINGS AND ELECTIONS.

Section I. The Board of Directors shall call a meeting of the League for the second Tuesday of March in each year, at which meeting a committee of seven members, to be known as the Nominating Committee, shall be chosen by the League at large in such manner as shall then be determined. There shall also be chosen at the same meeting, and in like manner, three inspectors and canvassers of the ensuing annual election, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the Board of Directors may fill any vacancies occurring in said last named offices.

Sec. II. The Nominating Committee shall select the names of three members of the League in good standing to be voted for at the annual election for Directors of the League for the ensuing year. The Nominating Committee shall post the names thus selected in a conspicuous place in the League headquarters for at least one week prior to the date of the annual meeting of the League, provided that at the annual meeting to be held on the first Monday in April, 1903, nine Directors shall be elected, three to serve for one year, three for two years and three for three years.

Sec. III. The Annual Meeting of the League shall be held on the first Monday of April in each year, for the purpose of hearing the reports of the officers of the League, amending the By-Laws, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting.

Sec. IV. The general meeting shall be held at eight o'clock P. M. of the day named in the last preceding section, but the polls for the election shall be open at 12 o'clock M. and shall remain open until 7 o'clock P. M., when they shall close.

Sec. V. Twenty-one members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the League. The President shall call all meetings of the League to order at the hour named in the notice thereof, and the Secretary shall note the names of the members present and make a record thereof.

Sec. VI. Should there be no quorum present at any special or called meeting of the League, the President shall adjourn such meeting to some subsequent day within one week thereafter.

Sec. VII. At the Annual Meeting, if all the business be not finished on the day of the meeting, or if there shall not be a quorum present, an adjournment shall be had to the next day at eight o'clock P. M., and adjournments may be had from day to day until a quorum is present, and the business of the meeting shall be finished.

Sec. VIII. The Order of Business at the Annual Meeting shall be as follows:

First—Reading the minutes of the previous meeting or meetings.

Second—Report of the Board of Directors.

Third—Report of Secretary.

Fourth—Report of Treasurer.

Fifth—Report of the Auditing Committee.

Sixth—Amendments to the By-Laws.

Seventh—Miscellaneous business.

Eighth—Declaring the result of the annual election.

Sec. IX. Whenever a special meeting of the League is called, the Board of Directors shall cause at least two days' notice thereof to be given by the Secretary. Such notices shall specify the objects for which such meetings are called and the Secretary shall address such notices to each member of the League.

Sec. X. The Board of Directors may call special meetings, either upon their own vote, or upon the application of ten members of the League, in writing.

Sec. XI. Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern at all meetings of the League so far as they are applicable and not inconsistent with these By-Laws.

Sec. XII. The Annual Election shall be by ballot by members who attend in person, and a plurality of the votes shall elect.

Sec. XIII. Delinquent members shall not be entitled to vote.

Sec. XIV. No officer or member shall, at any time, vote by proxy.

#### **ARTICLE X.—AMENDMENTS.**

Section I. These By-Laws may be altered, amended or repealed, according to Section 304, of the Civil Code, or by the unanimous vote of the Board of Directors at any regular meeting thereof, provided, however, that all such amendments must be offered in writing, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Board of Directors, and must be immediately posted by the Secretary, on the "Bulletin Board" of the League.

#### **ARTICLE XI.—LADIES' ANNEX.**

Section I. The Board of Directors may set aside such portion of the Club quarters as they may deem proper to be used as a Ladies' Annex. All ladies of members' families shall be entitled to make use of such annex upon the member filing with the Secretary their names, addresses and relationship to himself. Members shall be responsible for all indebtedness contracted by the ladies of his family. Ladies of deceased members' families shall also be entitled to the use of the annex. Members shall not be entitled to use the annex unless accompanied by ladies.

The use and conduct of the annex shall be under such rules and regulations as the Board of Directors may prescribe from time to time.

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## **HOUSE RULES**

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1. The Club shall be opened at 6:30 A. M. and closed at 12 midnight, but members who may be in the building at that hour, or who occupy apartments in the Club, shall not be influenced by this rule, although refreshments will not be served after midnight.
2. Smoking allowed in the Ladies' Annex.
3. Members are requested to remove their hats while in the Club rooms.
4. Ladies may be shown through the Club between the hours of 10 A. M. and 11 A. M.
5. Pipe smoking will not be allowed in the Club, other than the dormitory floors.
6. No dogs allowed in the Club.
7. A member breaking or injuring any article belonging to the Club shall pay its prime cost, or replace the same. Said members should report same to the Manager and settle therefor.
8. No subscription papers shall be circulated nor any article be exposed for sale, nor shall any picture or decoration be placed in the Club without the authority of the Board of Directors. Nor shall any notices be posted on the bulletin board without the authority of the Board of Directors.
9. The game of poker is strictly prohibited, and it is left to the honor of the members of the Club not to encourage gambling.
10. The Secretary shall furnish to each member a copy of the By-Laws and list of the membership. The Club does not assume responsibility for any business transacted elsewhere than through the Manager's office.
11. No member of the Club shall be permitted to send any employee of the Club on any purpose, or to call upon him for any service which takes him away from his duties in the Club. No fee or gratuity of any kind shall be paid or given to any employee of the Club, and any employee accepting same shall be liable to immediate discharge. The member giving such fee shall be subject to reprimand by the Board of Directors. No servant shall be reprimanded or in any manner punished by a member. In the event of any fault being found it should be reported to the Manager.

12. Non-resident Members remaining over three months in Los Angeles shall be charged resident dues while here.
13. No resident of the City of Los Angeles shall be entitled to a guest card.
14. Non-residents residing fifty miles or more from Los Angeles may be introduced at the Club by a member for a period not to exceed thirty days in any twelve months. No card will be issued for less than four days. No guest may remain in the Club after the departure of the member introducing him, unless a guest card has been issued to him. Members may have only five guest cards outstanding at any one time. All guests must be registered by the member introducing them.
15. No checks will be cashed for visitors or temporary members, unless same be endorsed by a member. Delinquent guests' accounts will be charged to the members introducing them on the first of the month following expiration of card.
16. No member shall take away from the rooms of the Club, upon any pretext whatever, any newspaper, pamphlet, book or other property of the Club, or in any way injure or destroy the same, under penalty of \$5.00 for each offense, which penalty or penalties the Board of Directors, on due proof, is required to enforce.
17. No demonstration in behalf of any sectarian body shall be allowed in the Club, but nothing contained herein shall prevent a demonstration in behalf of the Republican Party.
18. Members are not permitted to talk in the library, and no drinks or refreshments will be served there. No books or papers will be sent from the library to the Ladies' Annex or the dormitories. No publication shall be placed in the library without the approval of the Board of Directors.
19. No dinners or refreshments will be served in the lobby, library or ladies' parlors.
20. The main dining rooms will be open for breakfast from 7:00 A. M. to 10:00 A. M.; for lunch, 11:30 A. M. to 2:00 P. M.; for dinner, 5:45 to 8:00 P. M. Members wishing to give private parties must notify the Manager of the intention one day beforehand.
21. Extra service will be charged for meals served in private dining rooms. Members desiring the use of same shall apply to the Manager the day before.
22. Parties occupying rooms must give notice at the office before noon on day they vacate same, or charge will be made for an additional day. An extra charge will be made for meals served in bedrooms.
23. Two persons occupying a bedroom of the Club shall each be charged for use of same.
24. The transient rate on bedrooms with bath shall be \$2.00; without, \$1.00.
25. All members having rooms in the Club are required to leave key in the office upon leaving the Club.
26. Gentlemen are not admitted to the Ladies' Annex unless accompanied by ladies. The Ladies' Annex is open from 11 A. M. to 8 P. M. Ladies of members' families are entitled to the privileges of the Ladies' Annex on their being registered by members. Their cards expire only with a membership.
27. Each member of the Club is entitled to register the names of the ladies, not members of his family, for the Ladies' Annex on a blank provided for that purpose. The names must be approved by the Board of Directors before cards will be issued. The privileges extended pursuant to such request will expire by limitation on the first day of January or the first day of July next succeeding the issuance of the ladies' card unless the member at whose instance the card is issued shall designate a shorter period. No card will be issued at the request of a member who is delinquent.
28. All meals in the Ladies' Annex must be signed for on a ticket for that purpose. No money can be paid for meals unless paid at the office. Bills will be rendered monthly to all ladies singing cards.

29. Widows and unmarried daughters of deceased members are entitled to the privileges of the Ladies' Parlor and Annex during hours in which same are open, subject to the regulations which may be deemed proper by the Board of Directors or Committee on Rules.

30. Ladies' parties will not exclude other members.

31. The sum of \$25.00 shall be the limit of any member's indebtedness to the Club, unless further credit be extended by the Board of Directors. When such limit shall have been reached the Manager shall notify the member of the fact, and such credit shall be discontinued until the entire amount shall have been paid.

32. All dues and indebtedness by members of the Club shall be due and payable on or before the fifth of each month, and if not paid before, shall become delinquent on the twentieth, and his name and the amount of his indebtedness shall be conspicuously posted by the Secretary in the room of the Club, and if said indebtedness remains unpaid on the last day of the month the member shall cease to have the privileges of the Club. The said delinquent member, upon application to the Board of Directors and the payment of all indebtedness, may be reinstated.

33. Any suggestion or complaints relative to the conduct of the Club shall be reported to the Manager.

34. None but Club members or their guests will be permitted the use of Club privileges. Employees will not be permitted to sign cards or take the privileges of the Club. They are paid by the Club and are expected to attend to their duties. Members will kindly observe this rule.
