

# ORGANIZATIONS UNITE EFFORTS FOR MASS FREEWAY PROTEST MEET

## Promise Decision on Parking Meters Soon

A definite decision on parking meters is expected to be reached by the Board of Directors of the Westwood Village Chamber of Commerce at its May 7 meeting, according to several Board members.

Last Monday's special parking meeting of the Board was dedicated to quizzing city traffic experts on the pros and cons of the controversial meters.

Lloyd Braff, general manager of the Los Angeles City Department of Traffic, and Hugh Gilman, the Depart-

ment's West Los Angeles Traffic engineer, warned the Board members that: "Street parking is a privilege and can be eliminated by the Traffic Department if necessity requires it."

The experts predicted that as traffic in West Los Angeles continues to increase, street parking along Wilshire and Westwood Blvds. will, "at some future time," be eliminated.

Concerning meters they said that wherever installed the meters met with no prolonged or widespread antagonism; they increased street parking turnover 30 per cent; and the creation of a Parking District or Parking

Authority is not a necessary step in the acquisition of meters.

On the public opinion front, Ray Ziff, one of the owners of the Westward Ho Market, 1515 Westwood Blvd., announced this week the results of his door-by-door survey of the merchants and tenants on Westwood Blvd. south of Wilshire Blvd. to Santa Monica Blvd.

Of the 167 people polled (all of whom signed their names along with their preference) 72 favored retaining the present two-hour posted parking limit; 44 favored the installation of parking meters; and 51 preferred a reduction of the present two-

## Opinion Unanimous That Comprehensive Survey Be Provided

A community-wide mass protest meeting aimed at killing a proposed modification as such of a segment of the proposed Olympic Freeway through Western Los Angeles will be held next Monday night, 8 p.m. at Webster Junior High School auditorium on Sawtelle Blvd., north of National.

The meeting is being held under auspices of the Richland Youth House Inc., board and the Richland Avenue Citizens Group of which Arthur Detwiler is chairman.

The meeting will be jointly chaired by Ben F. Goldman Jr., chairman of the Coordinating

Committee of Westside Communities, and Mrs. Gordon Holden, Richland area P-TAer and committee member.

"Those who want to protest the proposed modification of the Olympic Freeway between Cataragus Ave. and Overland Ave. because of the breach of faith of the California Highway Commission in failing to prepare an overall restudy of the entire route west from La Cienega are invited to do so next Monday at Webster Junior High School," Goldman said.

Goldman explained that the Webster meeting will be preparatory to the hearing the Highway Commission has called for on Friday, April 27 in the State Building in Los Angeles at 10 a.m.

Westwood Gardens Civic Association leaders headed by the president, Mack Berryhill, met Tuesday night to map strategy for their protests. Berryhill said "many other community representatives joined us including Palms, and other sections of Rancho Park and West LA, and all are asking their members to attend this mass meeting next Monday. Our Westwood Gardens association members are asked to attend as well," Berryhill said.
